The JOY of Homework

At Horizon Prep we aim to partner with you in your child's education for the best experience possible. I have found that the following "tips" have proven helpful for transforming stressful "homework time" into a structured, peaceful time in which all can benefit. Students that spend more time on homework, on average, do better academically than children who don't.

The Homework challenge: Try these suggestions for 2 weeks CONSISTENTLY and see if the JOY returns:

- Do homework at the same time and in the same place each day – find what time works best for your family and stick to it.
- Make sure all the materials the student will need are available – paper, pencils, sharpener, crayons, and a water bottle.
- Be positive about homework – The attitude you express about homework will be the attitude your child acquires .
- If homework is meant to be done alone, stay away – too much involvement can prevent the positive effects it is intended to give.
- When your child asks for help, provide guidance, not answers – if the child can get out of work by playing helpless, they will—and then they'll try it at school!
